The firm has introduced a triangular-shaped knife which, for many years, has been widely used in Europe and other foreign countries. "It's faster and easier to use, and does a better job than conventional hoof-trimming nippers," says Simon. "Once you get used to it, you'll be able to trim hooves in half the time it now takes with your conventional tools."

In addition to the triangular knife, Simon recommends "tooling up" with a small 8 in. hand shear for clipping hoof points. He sells the knife and shear, plus a special hand file for keeping the triangular knife sharp, for \$57. Or, you can buy the tools separately at \$29.50 for the knife, \$9 for the file, and \$27.50 for the shear.

Cattle Care Service also manufacturers a Simon-designed, hydraulically-operated table to accommodate "the smallest calf to the wildest cow or largest bull" for hoof trimming, Two rolls of plastic swips around hale, wranning it tightly in plastic

## Bale Wrap Machine Works On The Ground

One man can wrap any size bale in less than a minute with four tight wraps of 3-ply plastic using a new machine imported from Scotland.

The new bale wrapper, imported by the Bale-Bonnet Co., Bloomsdale, Mo., is unique in that it wraps bales on the ground in the field. Requires just one tractor and one operator, who never has to leave the tractor. To wrap, the operator backs the 3-pt. mounted wrapper up to the bale, lifting the rear tailgate of the wrapper over the bale. As the machine rolls the bale along the ground, a hydraulic driven arm, fitted with two rolls of stretch-cling plastic, spins around the bale, overlapping each layer of plastic 50%. Four layers can be put on in less than a minute, moving the bale about 8 ft. along the ground. Once wrapped, bales can be moved

with a bale spike. You simply cover the hole with tape afterwards.

"It's been on the market for 2 years in Scotland with great results," says Alan Schaefer, president of Bale-Bonnet Co. "You can either wrap it 2 times for protection from the elements or 4 times to make silage. Works much better than bags because it wraps so tight. And, it costs only about \$3 per bale to wrap for silage versus as much as \$8 per bale for bags."

Bale wrapper handles bales up to 6 ft. in dia. Machine sells for around



# Plastic Paddles Stop Elevator Plug-Ups

"Stops elevator plug-ups, especially in wet corn," says George Kuchar, Carlinville, Ill., who's come up with replacement paddles for clean grain elevators in Deere, IH, Allis Chalmers, White, and Massey combines.

Kuchar's ¼-in thick hard plastic paddles are ½-in. wider than factory rubber paddles, filling out the entire elevator. They let less corn slip through and can carry twice the load of rubber paddles. He says they also last longer and won't be chewed on by rodents. You can replace all the paddles at once or intersperse the plastic paddles with the rubber paddles. They sell for \$3.50 apiece.
