GM Settles Pickup Lawsuits

General Motors has paid at least \$495 million to settle nearly 300 lawsuits filed by families of victims who were killed in crashes involving the company's line of C/K pickups, the Associated Press recently reported.

News of the payouts leaked out when a federal judge in Missoula, Mont., released an exhibit in a case brought by the estate of a family killed in a pickup accident.

The suits involve C/K trucks with fuel tanks mounted outside the vehicles' protective frames. GM produced more than 9 million of the pickups from 1973 to 1987. They later changed the design.

GM opposed the judge's release of the settlement information. A company spokesman said the number and size of settlements did not mean the C/K pickups were unsafe.

However, the documents released said 297 settlements of lawsuits involving the pickup resulted in payouts of an average of \$1.6 million per individual.

Federal regulators dropped an investigation into the line of trucks in 1994 in exchange for a \$51 million payment from GM that was earmarked for safety programs.

An Early Look At A New Full-Sized Pickup

The first Japanese car company to take on American dominance in the full-sized pickup market is Nissan, which plans to start rolling out its V-8 powered Titan this fall. It will be



built at a new factory in Canton, Mississippi. The only other Japanese pickup that comes close is the 7/8th size Toyota T-100 Tundra, which came out about 10 years ago.

The Titan is 18 plus ft. in length with a 139.8-in. wheelbase and the maximum width allowed. It matches the Chevy Silverado, Dodge Ram, Ford F-150 and GMC Sierra in size.

The Titan is powered by a 5.6-liter DOHC V-8 engine, a 5speed automatic transmission, rear or 4-wheel drive (with a choice of two transfer cases), and two cab-bed combinations: A King Cab with rear-hinged back doors and a 6 1/2-ft. bed, or a Crew Cab with real back doors and a 5.6-ft. bed.

According to a review of an early-model test drive in Automobile Magazine, the Titan rivals the best trucks out there in power and handling. In fact, the writer who drove the new truck says it's the first full-size pickup he's ever driven that doesn't drive like one.

Giant Dairy Community

Plans are in the works to build a nearly 2,000-acre gated community in the Mojave Desert of California to house 600 dairy farmers and their families alongside about 90,000 head of cattle.

Planned by two California businessmen, the giant dairy community aims to produce electricity in a big way, along with dairy products. Methane digesters will turn manure into 50 megawatts of electricity. While digesters aren't new, they've never been used on so large a scale before.

Total cost of the proposed development is \$1 billion and will include 30 dairy farms built from scratch, each with 3,000 cows. Each farm will be located on a 1,920-acre irrigated chunk of land.

Even supporters concede putting 90,000 Holsteins in the midst of the desert is unusual. Nevertheless, the project is being propelled by two powerful political currents: the need to reduce agricultural pollution and the need to diversify and expand California's sources of electricity. (AP)
