High energy prices have inspired an amazing new generation of inventors. This issue features a wide variety of latest new ideas, such as the following:

"Algae Oil"

Algae oil might be the fuel of the future, says Glen Kertz, scientist at Vertigro Energy, a company that's come up with an innovative way to produce up to 100,000 gal. of algae oil per acre per year. (In contrast, corn yields about 500 gal. of ethanol per acre.) The El Paso, Texas, company pumps water through clear plastic bags suspended in tight rows in greenhouses. As algae forms, it's siphoned off and refined into fuels. Vertigro scientists are currently identifying which variety of algae is best suited for the purpose. The company claims that if an area the size of 1/10th of the state of New Mexico could be converted to greenhouse algae production, it would produce enough oil to meet the transportation needs of the entire U.S. (www.globalgreensolutionsinc.com).

Biodiesel "Breakthrough"

A Minnesota college student has made quite a splash in the biodiesel world by coming up with a new way to produce fuel out of plant material. Brian Krohn, 21, teamed up with his college chemistry professor, Arlin Gyberg, to design a process that can squeeze oil from a wide variety of products, from animal fat to algae to distillers grains left over from ethanol production. What's unique about the new process is that it uses very little water and doesn't produce a lot of waste.

Normally, companies make biodiesel by mixing soybean oil with a sodium hydroxide "catalyst" in a tank that's heated to a high temperature. The "batch" process takes hours to complete and produces waste that must be neutralized with either hydrochloric or sulfuric acid. The new method, called the Mcgyan method, uses a metal oxide catalyst that's added to feedstocks inside a tubelike reactor, using a continuous flow method that's much more efficient and produces little waste.

A \$5 million production plant is under construction by StarTec Corp. in Isanti, Minn., which has licensed the technology. The plant will produce 3 million gal. of fuel a year using the process. It's slated to go into production in October of 2008.

Hybrid Car To Get 113 Mpg

Toyota's Prius hybrid car has been around for about 10 years now and hundreds of thousands have been sold. If you've had a chance to ride in one, you know it has plenty of power and maneuverability.


The British magazine AutoExpress recently reported that Toyota engineers are targeting fuel mileage of 113 mpg for the next generation of Prius hybrids, with 0 to 60 acceleration of less than 10 sec. When the new models are introduced in 2009, they'll have smaller and lighter lithium ion batteries, which have more capacity than nickel hydride batteries. The more powerful batteries will allow the hybrids to run more on electricity and less on gas.

Air Car Hits The Market

A French-designed car powered by compressed air can go 70 mph and has a range of 125 miles on flat roads. It uses high pressure air to drive two pistons and you can breathe the car's exhaust. The Midi car has been on the market on a limited basis in France for a couple years. Recently, India's Tata Motors bought rights to build and sell the cars in India.

The Midi's engine weighs just 80 lbs. Fuel is compressed to 4,350 psi but the company, Negre's Motor Development, says that in a collision the tank would harmlessly split down the sides with no explosion. Because of its limited range, compressed air filling stations will obviously have to be close by wherever the cars are sold.

A U.S. company, Zero Pollution Motors in New Paltz, N.Y. (www.zeropollutionmotors.com), plans to roll the car out in the U.S. in 2010 for \$18,000.

Three stories in the last issue of FARM SHOW about add-on hydrogen kits designed to boost fuel mileage, sparked tremendous interest amount readers. The companies featured have been swamped with orders and inquiries.

All three hydrogen innovators said they're working on getting back to people and trying to fill orders. One of the hydrogen injectors featured, from Robert Ferreira (robmadferreira@xtalwind.net), is not on the market. He developed it for his own use but is considering putting detailed plans together over the next couple months. The other two companies featured, Eagle Research (www.eagle-research.com) and Stan McDonald (smcdonal@kos.net) are in production and shipping units.

One note: FARM SHOW purchased a hydrogen kit from Eagle Research and we're installing it on a vehicle for road tests. Once we have a few thousand miles under our belt, we will report the results. So stay tuned.
