Wireless Ultrasound Goggles Check Cattle

Farmers and veterinarians now have a new tool for conducting pregnancy checks on cattle.

IMV Viewing says its new ultrasound goggles are used wirelessly and with an Easi-Scan: Go probe to provide an ultrasound picture of a fetus.

"You can visualize the fetus, heartbeat, check ovaries for cysts, see embryo transfers and scan ovaries to identify an animal's cycle status," says Tom Cardinal, IMV Imaging Sales Specialist.

The goggles receive the ultrasound signal from the probe and display ultrasound images to a tablet, computer or smartphone.

"The freedom of not having a cable from the goggles to the ultrasound machine is the big benefit," Cardinal claims. "Plus, the ability to use a smart device like a cellphone or tablet as an external viewer with a 50 to 75-ft, range."

According to Cardinal, the system is 100 percent accurate with errors only occurring due to image interpretation. At 30 days of pregnancy, a fetus is approximately the size of a fingernail, so operator experience with probe placement is still critical.

IMV Imaging, a Scottish-based company,

was the first to incorporate and market the wireless feature for the goggles in the fall of 2018.

New ATV Looks Like A Hummer By Chad Smith

The 2021 Massimo Warrior at Dale's Auto Mall in Jamestown, N. Dak., looks like a cross between a Humvee and a Gator.

"It's a product we just happened to stumble across," says Dale Lende, the owner of Dale's Auto Mall. "A young man came in to introduce me to the Warrior line, and I thought they were unique enough to be a lot of fun to sell."

Lende buys directly from the company, which gives them access to parts and more availability of products to better serve their customers.

"It's 6-in. wider than any other comparable UTV in the industry," Lende says. "The Warrior has enough size that three large adults can sit in the cab comfortably.

"This thing is very durable," he says. "The frame is an inch thicker than anything else in the industry. It has 6-ply tires and an electric lift box that can lift up to 500 lbs."

It's got some amenities too, including air conditioning, heat, wipers and blinkers. It's street legal and road-ready. "We've only been selling these for a year, and they're already getting better and better," Lende says.

"This is a great four-wheeler for the farm," he says. "It's not designed for play like many others are. This one is intended to work. It's a 1,000-cc, 50-mph engine.

"The Warrior features a 5,500-lb. winch in front," Lende says. "It comes with a 2-in.

receiver. No other UTV offers that."

The Warrior also has a snorkel airflow system. It's different from other ATV/UTVs that take their airflow from under their frames. The air for a Warrior engine comes from the snorkel on top of the vehicle.

"The air intake is much cleaner than bringing it in from under the vehicle where it kicks up things like dust, water, and mud," he said.

The frame is solid steel and truly does resemble a smaller Humvee. The headlights are comparable to those on a car, with high and low beams.

"It has a light bar in the center and another on top," he says. "When a farmer or rancher looking for cattle turns those on at night, those lights are amazing. Those lights also come in handy when farmers and ranchers are out fencing."

The vehicle comes in black, green and tan, with tan being the most popular color among customers.

The tan 2021 Massimo Warrior (called Quicksand) retails for \$24,700, as does the black-colored Warrior. The Massimo Dominator X2 LTZ (green) is \$15,995.

Lawn Tractor's Tires Swapped For Tracks

When Dick Critel, owner of \overline{D} &S Tires, retired the company's tractor mower after decades of use, he had an idea. Instead of sending it to the scrapyard, he decided to replace the tires with tracks.

In December of 2020, employee Doug Bauer and others at the company began the transformation of the 1980 garden tractor.

As a long-standing tire and track retread, re-lug, and repair shop, they had the experience to turn the idea into reality.

"The first thing I did was get it on the bench and strip it," Doug says. "Using a toy track tractor that we keep in our lobby as a model for the conversion, we were able to scale everything to size to make it as realistic as possible."

He kept the original wheel rims, wrapped them in steel, covered, and built with rubber like the undercarriage of a tractor. The steering wheel was made compatible through a linkage block. Twin master cylinders from a 98 Honda Civic for the hydraulic clutch actuated the disk brakes, pushing fluid through the lines and applying optimal pressure. Fourpiston calipers came from a Honda CBR1000 Sport Bike. Custom rotors and hubs were also added.

Bauer says the brakes were the trickiest part of the modification and a lot of effort was put into getting the lawn tractor to turn as it should. After some trial and error, it was scaled up using the Honda system. This allowed for easier turning using the original steering column to move the block through the linkage system.

Eight months of effort later they successfully ran the newly tracked lawn tractor in the Cuming County Fair in West Point, Neb., where it looked and moved like the real deal.

The uniquely engineered machine will be used for advertising in the D&S Tire locations.
