Jack Russell Dogs Are Death On Rats

"I fought rats for 4 years and couldn't make a dent in their population," says Pennsylvania dairyman Ken James, of Bedford. "I used \$150 to \$200 worth of rat poison and even got 15 cats from the Humane Society to try to solve the problem, but nothing worked."

Then, Ken's sister-in-law brought Eve, her lack Russell Terrier, to Ken's farm. "Eve had never been on a farm. Yet, within 20 minutes, she killed three rats," Ken says.

After her farm visit, Eve wasn't content back in her city home so Ken gladly kept her. He now owns three lack Russells.

The Jack Russell Terrier, bred specifically to hunt and kill rats, was developed by a Rev. Jack Russell in England about 150 to 200 years ago, according to Ken. The breed apparently stems from a combination of Fox Terrier, Bull Terrier and Sealyham Terrier.

'They're more muscular and a little bigger than a regular Rat Terrier," explains Ken. "They're a small dog, about 15 to 20 lbs., and stand about 11 to 13 in. at the shoulder, but they have teeth the size of a German Shepherd's."

The little dogs are tough enough to attack and kill groundhogs and occasionally even raccoons. Generally, they bite bigger animals over the mouth so as not to get bitten them-

"When a Jack Russell gets a rat, he just gives one shake of his head and



breaks the rat's neck. With a larger animal, however, they have to shake for some time before they kill it. It takes them five to ten minutes." Ken

The Jack Russells are gentle around children, despite their fierce attitude toward rats and other small animals. Ken says they make excellent watchdogs, too. They'll also fight, and sometimes kill, intruding dogs much larger than themselves. Unfortunately, though, they're also intolerant of barn cats and chickens.

Jack Russells cost between \$200 and \$350 apiece.

New Mobile Backhoe Mounts In Truck Bed

Now there's a truck-mounted backhoe available for digging water lines, drainage ditches and most other jobs where a light backhoe is needed.

The Bradco Hoe mounts on a 1-ton or larger truck which makes it especially mobile. "You can save time by driving at maximum legal speed to the job," explains Bradco President Brad Schnittjer. "Our backhoe folds out of the truckbed and is ready to work in just 20 seconds," he notes.

Two options allow you to power the backhoe hydraulically with either an auxillary 16 hp Kohler engine or with a pto pump driven by the truck transmission. There's also a choice of 12. 18. 24 and 36 in. buckets.

Mounting consists of welding

mounting brackets onto the truck bed after removing the tailgate. Two tapered screws hold the unit on brackets and permit quick removal.

Cost of the Bradco Hoe ranges from \$8,000 to \$10,500, depending on the options chosen.

This same hoe also mounts on a tractor with special brackets available from Bradco. Instead of mounting on the 3-pt. hitch, the Bradco Hoe mounts under the tractor belly for increased stability and less strain on the 3-pt. lift arms.
