Power Brush Removes Rust, Paint, Scale

If you do a lot of shop work and can use one of the best rust and paint removers money can buy, the new "Scavenger" from Chicago Monarch may be worth looking into.

It's rough and rugged, and is available with both a cutter head and wire brush head. It removes paint, rust and scale without dust, and can also be used to prepare concrete floors for patching.

Available in an air-drive model

which requires a 3 to 5 hp compressor which delivers a minimum of 22 cfm at 90 lbs. psi. Electric models operate off 110 v. and are rated at 2,300 rpm. Prices range from \$275 for air to \$295 for electric.

Sand Blast Gun

New from Lindberg Products is a relatively inexpensive sand blast gun that sells for \$41.

It operates off 60 to 150 psi air pressure and handles a wide variety of abrasives, including silica sand and metal shot. To use, you simply fill the unit's one-quart metal container with abrasive material and connect to an existing air supply.

Said to be efficient for sand blasting small parts, and for removing rust, paint and dirt from hard-to-get-at areas.

Gun body is zinc die cast. Comes with Diamonite nozzle and one hardened steel jet nozzle. For larger jobs, the metal container can be set aside and the gun used directly off a larger hopper or bucket, using a siphon tube.

Easier Way to Make Pipe Welds

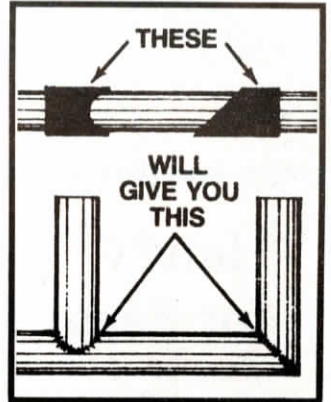
Someone has finally figured out an easy way to make professional-looking joints and seams when welding gates, skids and other items out of pipe.

Called the Welder's Helper, it's a kit made up of 22 patterns for making saddle and elbow cuts in pipe ranging from 1½ in. through 8 in. in dia. "The patterns require no special skill and will help you make professional looking joints the first and every time," says Austin Graham, inventor and marketer of the kit.

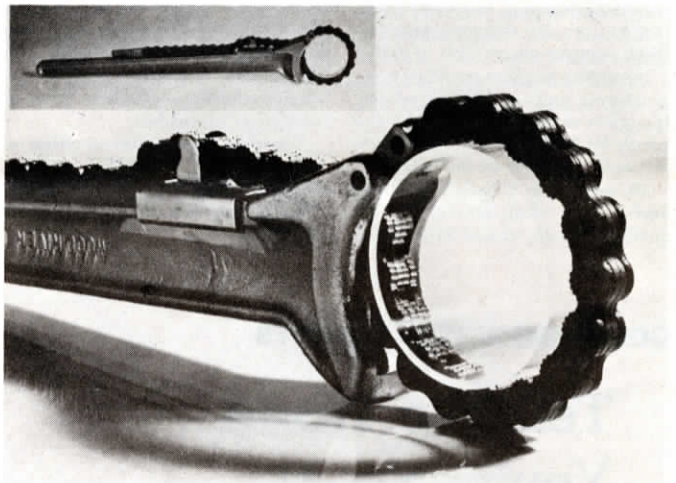
Using the pattern's provided, you make your own wrap-around templates out of a medium weight material, such as gasket material.

Set of 22 patterns sells for \$12.65.

Chain Wrench Can Be Used As Vice

"It does everything a conventional pipe wrench does, and a lot more. Manufacturers of PVC and fiberglass pipe tell us ours is the only wrench on the market that will hold without tearing or distorting their products," explains Parker. "The 360 degree uniform pressure wrap on our wrenches gives them more working force than ordinary wrenches."

Available in a 14 in. model (fits

objects up to 2½ in. dia.) and a 24 in. model (fits objects up to 5 in. dia.).

"By dropping the handle into a stake hole of a pickup bed, you have a portable vice. By using one wrench against the other, you can tighten or loosen objects such as hydraulic cylinders, stuck or rusted pipe, or arbor shafts on disks. Hex nuts or other irregular shapes are no problem to these wrenches," says the manufacturer.
