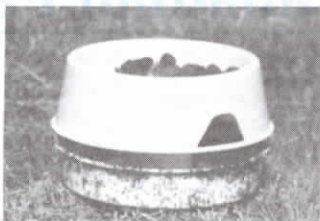


Ant-Proof Pet Dish

"You can set it on top of an ant pile and you won't get a single ant inside the dish," says the manufacturer of the Pet-Eze ant-proof feed dish for dogs and cats.

The new dish has a second pan underneath that's filled with water and a few drops of liquid dish washing soap. When ants crawl over the side of the bottom dish, they drown in the water inside. A hole in the side makes it easy to see if there's still water in the bottom.

It saves food, reduces disease, and prevents stings on the nose or mouth of animal. The feed dish lifts off the base for cleaning or filling. Sells for \$9.95 3-cup

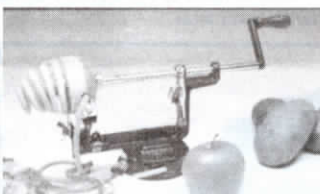


Old Fashioned Apple Peeler

Metal "Wash Bar" Deodorizes Smelly Hands

Here's a product we spotted at the recent International Housewares Show in Chicago that was designed to remove smelly food odors from hands but might work just as well to remove hog and other farm-related odors.

The "Nonion" (stands for "no onion") is a lightweight bar made of a combination of alloys that reacts with odor-carrying oils on the hands. You use it like a bar of soap under running water. No soap or scrubbing is necessary to remove odors. The metal in the bar never loses its effectiveness, according to the company. It's guaranteed for life to remove strong odors like onion, garlic and fish. Washing it in water removes odors from the bar. Sells for \$7.95.

Sliding Dog Leash For Pickups

Some states already have laws against letting dogs ride freely in the back of a pickup and many more are considering them. This new sliding leash complies with existing laws yet keeps pets happy and safe.

Called the Leash O'Life, it consists of an aluminum track that mounts in the center of the truck bed. The dog is leashed to a short cable that's anchored by a plastic slider that glides easily along the track.

Look Your Best! Wear Jewelry Made From Corn

A Minnesota farm woman is turning field and ornamental corn into colorful "corn jewelry", including earrings, necklaces, bracelets, headbands, ceremonial belts, etc.

Heidi Scott, of Dunnell, buys the ornamental corn from a South Dakota farmer. She drills tiny holes in each kernel, then strings the kernels together. Scott and her husband Brian raise 1,200 acres of corn and beans. "My products are all unique but I'm not the first person to make jewelry from corn. I was told that there's a corn necklace in the Smithsonian institution that's 150 years old."

Scott got the idea for "corn jewelry" during the cool, wet summer of 1993. Brian, a pilot, made some commercial flights to Indiana. "He'd bring back this big, beautiful corn from Indiana and throw it on the dining room table where we had our small ears of flood corn laying. It was kind of depressing."

Soon afterward, Scott threaded fishing line through some corn to make a pair of earrings. "I decided I was going to wear the earrings until the harvest was complete."

Steel Gutter Scoop

"This scoop will easily clean out even the most plugged-up gutters," says Richard Cox about the hand scoop he made.

The 4-in. square scoop is made out of sheet steel. It'll fit inside a 5-in. wide gutter. The only problem he's found is that roof overhangs and protruding nails can sometimes hamper the scoop's ability to get at everything.
