

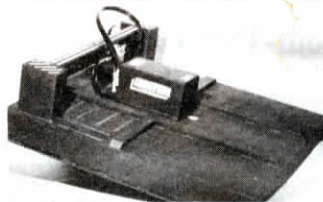
Low-Cost Safety Light

"It could save a life and possibly help avoid a liability charge against you and your farm," says Bosch Lights of its low-cost safety flasher for tractors, combines, wagons, trailers, bicycles or whatever.

Powered by a 9 volt alkaline battery that lasts for more than 100 hours of continuous operation, it emits a flashing red light (100 flashes per minute) that's highly visible both day and night for well over a half mile. The flashing light doesn't get dimmer as the battery weakens. Operates at full brightness down to 4.8 volts.

Individual self-contained lights are 2 in. wide, 3 in. high and 1.5 in. deep. To mount, just drill two screwholes. They sell for \$36.96, plus \$5 for postage and handling. The price drops to \$30 each, including shipping and handling, if you buy 10 or more to equip all of your road-driven equipment with the handy new safety flasher.

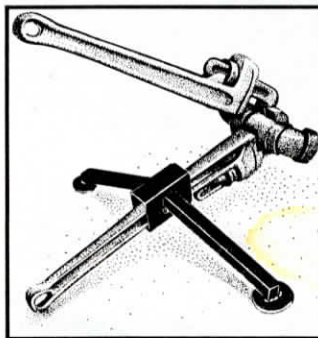
650 Bu. Grain Wagon

"So far as we know, it's the largest augerless grain wagon on the market," says Kukur-Parker Industries of its just-introduced model 650, rated at "up to 650 bu. capacity".

Equipped with 5 ply 18 by 22 tires, its running gear is rated at 20 tons. Its wheel base is 12 ft. Track width is 7 ft., 4 in.

The load is evenly distributed along heavy 6 in by 3 in. structural tubing sills. Steep side slopes and tapered front panel speed flow, prevent bridging. Tail and turn signal lights are standard. Grain can be diverted directly below into a pit, or to the side. A small metering chute built into the large main chute provides low-flow discharge, and a handy place to collect samples for testing moisture. All four wheels have inertia hydraulic brakes.

Hay Stack "Peak" For Tarping Bales

New hay stack "peak" creates a ridge that holds the tarp 5 ft. off the hay down the center of the stack. It lets air circulate over the stack and sheds rain and snow, according to Glen Knopp, manager, Inland Tarp & Cover, Inc., Almira, Wash.

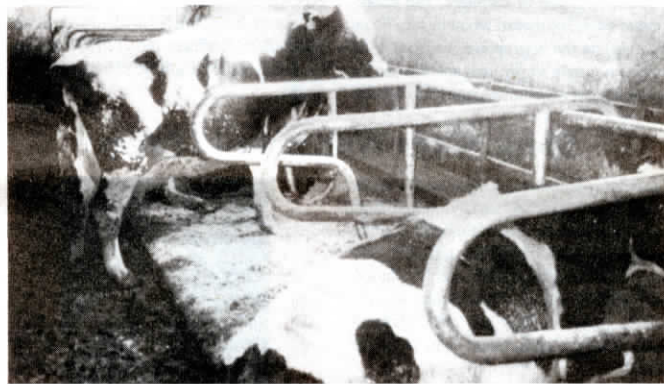
The tarp ridge consists of 10-ft. sections of 3-in. PVC pipe supported by triangle-shaped steel supports made out of 1/2-in. reinforcing rod and steel tubing. Both sides of the waterproof tarp are staked to the bottom of the stack.

"It eliminates the need to pile bales on top of the stack to form a peak and then remove them before loading hay onto your truck," says Knopp.



Sells for about \$3 per running ft. The company also sells plans to make your own tarp ridge.

"Swing Stall" Divider For New, Existing Barns

Designed to "put comfort back into free stalls," it pivots at the front and swings upward to eliminate damage to both cow and free stall. "The design eliminates the need for a center bar, giving the cow all the clearance she needs to lunge forward when getting up," explains inventor-manufacturer A. Cliff Bakx. "Conventional stalls have something in the way to obstruct her natural movement. With ours, if she hits the stall divider when getting up, it swings up and out of the way without bruising her. If a cow can't get up because of sickness or death, the stall divider can be manually raised up and out of the way. If you need an extra pen or box stall, just lift up a few stall dividers

and put in a temporary gate.

"Stall dividers, made of thick wall 2.5 in. galvanized pipe, are heavy enough so cattle won't play with them, yet light enough to swing up and out of harm's way if bumped by cows as they get up. Since there's very little bearing on the front pivoting hinge, stalls generally can be wall mounted. In most cases, stalls only 45 in. wide provide ample stretching room for cows."

Designed for new or existing free stall barns, the "swing stall" dividers sell for right at \$100 (Canadian) each.

New All-Purpose "Rollermower"

New from Worksaver is the revolutionary Rollermower, an all-purpose pto-driven finishing mower that does it all — the lawn, ditches, shelterbelts and around buildings and fences.

It takes a 5 ft. wide swath and rides on two full-width 6.5 in. dia. steel rollers front and rear, and full length skids on each side. The unique design provides a uniform cutting height without scalping and virtually eliminates problems with thrown objects, the manufacturer points out. Cutting height is

adjustable from .5 to 4 in.

The Rollermower's four replaceable swing away blades mount on one large steel rotating disk, eliminating belts and pulleys. The mower mounts on tractors with standard Cat III 3-pt. hitches and can be offset to the right 12 in. for close-up mowing around buildings, trees and fences.

Sells for \$2,995.

New Rotary Cutter For Skid Loaders

You can make your skid steer loader work harder by equipping it with a new rotary cutter from Ammbusher Mfg.

The rugged rotary takes a 60 in. swath and cuts everything in its path (up to 3 in. dia.). Cutting height is adjustable from 0 to 36 in. Available with single or bi-directional cutting blades. Attaches or detaches in seconds via a Bob-tach hookup.

New Sorting Paddle

"It's the best new livestock sorting tool since the electric prod — which it replaces," says the manufacturer of Paddle Stix, billed as "a safer, cheaper and more humane way to sort cattle, hogs or sheep."

The shaft (1/2 in. dia.) of individual sorting "Stix" is made of vinyl coated fiberglass to eliminate shattering and splinters. The paddle head (6 in. wide and 12 in. long) is made of high density polyethylene.

"Key to its amazing effectiveness is its flexibility, and the visibility of the paddle to livestock of all ages. You can pour BB's into the paddle for more noise," the manufacturer points out.

Available with 42 or 48 in. shafts, the Paddle Stix sell for \$12.50 each.
