BUYING TIPS YOU CAN USE

Randomly selected farmers "tell it like it is" in nominating their "best" and "worst" buys.

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Bob Dusek, Belleville, Kan.: "I wish we had two so we could put them together and keep one in the field," says Bob about his "worst buy" Deere 220 disk. "The hitch broke in the middle, cast standards have broken, and the main axle came off. It does a very poor job leveling."

Laurel Endresen, Eaglesham, Alberta: "Our International 806 tractor was out of commission for the entire crop year because of a couple O-rings that were missing on the fuel pump. They cost about 75 cents each but the dealer could not find them in a 'cross-country search'. Turns out he had them in his parts bin all the time."

Laurel's had good luck with his Honda 185 ATC. "We do everything with it from chasing cows to picking roots. It can do almost anything. With the whole family using it, it's never here when you need it."

Marc Reising, Wauzeka, Wis.: Marc nominates his New Holland 851 round baler and his New Idea 244 manure spreader as "best buys". "The baler is easy to get started and the automatic tie is a time saver. It makes a good bale and it's a well-built

John Pierskalla, St. Cloud, Minn.: "It's real easy on fuel and a very nice tractor to handle. No problems whatsoever and it's priced much more reasonably than red or green for the same power," says John about his "best buy" White 2-70 diesel.

Darle R. Baker, Ohio City, Ohio:
"My M2 Corn Plus Allis Chalmers
Gleaner combine is my most recent
best buy. The cab, controls, and hydraulics are excellent. The machine is
well-balanced, agile, easy to service
and the various components are readily accessible. The Pacer grain loss
monitor will surprise most operators
by letting them traverse a wider
speed range than they thought possible. The auto-reel speed is delightfully responsive to these speed
changes, especially in soybeans. It
also controls the cornhead speed.

"Allis Chalmers' wide-spaced hardened cylinder bars have worked well except in one drought-ripened field of wheat. The company has also been very flexible and reasonable. Originally I wanted to put a Deere flex-head on the Gleaner but I wanted to equip it with a Universal Harvester reel, made by Massey Ferguson. Deere wouldn't send a head out without a reel while Allis Chalmers would and did."

Roger Bunten, Charlotte, Vt.: "It's the greatest thing since mother-hood," says Roger, pleased with his ¼ yard Mighty Bite loader bucket made by Ag Bag Corp., Astoria, Ore. "We use it to load log splitters and handle anything from manure to grain. It's also great for what it was intended — unloading silage stuffed into long, plastic Ag Bags. Our Ag Bagger machine is also a best buy. It keeps feed as well or better than conventional storage at a far better price.

"Another best buy is our Glencoe Soilsaver. It's a wondrous machine and does a beautiful job ridging and breaking up hard clay. Other than points and sweeps, I don't see how I'll ever wear it out."

John Zuck, Prince Albert, Sask.: "My best buy has been a 403 cu. in. Oldsmobile engine that replaced my worst buy 350 Oldsmobile diesel in my 1980 GMC ½-ton pickup. The total personality of the truck has changed. I can trust it. Installation was very simple and can be done in one good day."

Al Malecha, Montgomery, Minn.:
"My worst buy is a 10,000-watt
Winco generator. Service is nonexistent. I had to take the unit, when
it was still new, to a private contractor to be serviced. That cost more than
\$600 on a new unit."

Charles Gurney, Princeton, Ont.: At the head of his "best buy" list is his Deere 8450 tractor. "Very easy on fuel, good lugging power, quiet cab and good visibility because the muffler and breather are on the side of the motor. We own all Deere tractors because of the way they hold their value and the service from dealers."

Glenn Maschmidt, Florissant, Mo.: Glenn says his Allis Chalmers 6080 tractor is both a "best" and "worst" buth a "best" and "worst" performs well but the Fiat rear end isn't too good. Would have been bet-

machine. The spreader is heavybuilt, and does an excellent job. Pulls easy for a tandem axle spreader."

Dennis Hoffman, Wilmont, Minn.:
"We put a Tiger Jaws cutterbar on our
combine last fall and we are really
pleased with it," says Dennis about
the cutterbar from the Herschel
Corp., Indianola, Iowa. "It cuts close,
reduces shatter, and increases
ground speed to keep the cylinder
full. It also works good on short
beans. The bar showed very little'
wear after one season."

Dennis says his International 1150 grinder-mixer equipped with a scale is also a "best buy". "I know that when I need a load of feed I'll get it done in 20 min. It works all the time and I haven't had a thing go wrong with it."

Clifford Froisland, Moorland, Iowa: He's disappointed with his Stanhoist field conditioner. "The tongue had to be beefed up since it was ready to break in two. Other welds on the frame also broke loose and I had to weld them up."

He's happy with two **Deere** tractors. "Our 1974 Deere 4030 has good power for its size. It does lots of loader work every winter. It has 3,400 hrs. on it and doesn't use oil. I also bought a 4430 Deere which has been a good tractor, too."
