"I own an Outdoor Power Equipment dealership, which is a fancy way of saying a lawn mower shop. Right now I'm looking for full-time, year-round employees. Almost every community in America has a shop, rental yard, or hardware store doing the same thing. Our industry has a chronic labor shortage and the reason is simple: fixing small engines just doesn't have the same flair as repairing hot rods or helicopters."

"Honestly, when I started out I didn't picture myself staying in this industry very long. Nearly 3 decades later, I'm still here. Small engines have kept a roof over my head, fed my family, and allowed me to put away a little for later. This past year, while tens of millions of Americans were left without an income or food on their tables, my company was able to retain its employees, add an extra position, and even have a little left over to help our local food bank. We did so while laboring under severe coronavirus restrictions here in rural California, a state that many claim is over regulated and impossible to do business in. I'm not bragging. I'm just trying to point out how stable this industry is."

"Don't have a small engine shop in your town? Start one. The initial cost is next to nothing, especially if you can use your dad's tools. I grew up a dirt poor hillbilly, but in this business clients won't care what you look like, whether or not you use a wheelchair, or who you like to cuddle up with at night. Whatever Happened To The Famous Jumping Combine

Ernie Brookins first appeared in FARM SHOW in 1985 with the Jumping Combine (Vol. 9, No. 4). The 7,000-lb., 21-ft. long machine with its 1,200 hp. dragster engine was loosely modeled after a Gleaner combine driven backwards. It was equipped with combine wheels, a 14-ft. header, and a Deere combine steering system. It was called the Silver Bullet.

Its first jump was in front of 6,000 spectators in Fargo, N. Dak. Rolling down a 1,000-ft. runway and up a 42-ft. ramp at close to 50 mph, it cleared a \$30,000 reproduction classic car.

"We ran the Silver Bullet for 5 years as a special attraction. We even did a Coors Light commercial with Chuck Yeager, the test pilot, and were in the movie American Harvest."

The Silver Bullet bit the bullet in Kenosha, Wis. "It broke a front wheel off as I jumped it," recalls Brookins. "I did a wheelie as we came down, but when I dropped the front end down, the broken front axle dug into the ground."

Fallen Oak Provided Lifetime Of Memories

When a large bur oak planted by my great grandfather was taken down last year by derecho winds, it was an emotional event for my family. A derecho is a fast moving, straight-line wind storm, and it was the worst wind I've ever experienced.

We totaled up the value the tree generated for several generations of Gogertys. My great grandfather planted the tree in 1863. Later settlers stopped to admire it, as it was the only tree standing tall amid the prairie grass. Later, its 90-ft. crown of limbs and leaves sheltered wildlife and provided shade.

During years when the tree's acorn production was good, two generations of Gogerty kids gathered and sold the acorns to a neighbor, who fed them to his hogs. Seasonal fallen branches were sold to make canes and cattle prods, and used as fuel for cook stoves.

Fortunately, when the ancient landmark fell it didn't cause any damage to our farm buildings. The wood provided fireplace fuel, and my son Tom even converted some of the wood into plate-size medallions for local farmers market collectors. To make the medallions, he placed 3 to 5-in. dia. branches in a vise and carefully sawed them into 3/4-in. thick sections. The bark-rimmed, epoxy-sealed medallions have back-to-back photos of the ancient oak on one side and "greetings of the season" on the other side. Will Human Composting Replace Burial, Cremation?

Don't want to be buried in the ground and cremation doesn't sound that great either? How about getting composted?

Recompose Inc. in Kent, Wash., recently started offering human composting as an environmentally friendly alternative. Bodies are placed in steel cylinders full of soil for 30 days, covered in wood chips and straw. After 30 days, they're moved to a "curing bin" to finish releasing carbon dioxide and then the remains can be returned to the family. According to Recompose, the finished soil is very similar to topsoil you might buy at a local nursery. Company CEO Katrina Spade says the process is tightly-controlled and driven by microbes. The cost is \$5,500. (www.recompose.life)

Process Turns Manure Into Odorless Powder

An invention developed to turn dog droppings into odorless powder is now being tested as a way to process the output of large dairy farms. Paulee CleanTec's CEO Ilan Levy says the BioLizer can turn a half ton of fresh animal manure into an odorless organic fertilizer in one hour (www.pauleecleantec.com). The low-cost chemical process neutralizes odors and eliminates pathogens. One of the first systems is currently in operation on a dairy farm in Israel.

The idea got its start when Israeli Oded Halperin got fined for failing to clean up after his dog. He approached his friend Oded Shoseyov, a nano technology inventor who has nearly 100 patents, and challenged him to find a better solution for disposal of dog poop. Shoseyov came up with a chemical method for converting waste and the two men formed Paulee Cleantec, which is affiliated with California-based Epic CleanTec (www.epiccleantec.com). In addition to Israel, there are currently projects underway in California and Brazil converting both human waste and animal manure into organic fertilizer.
