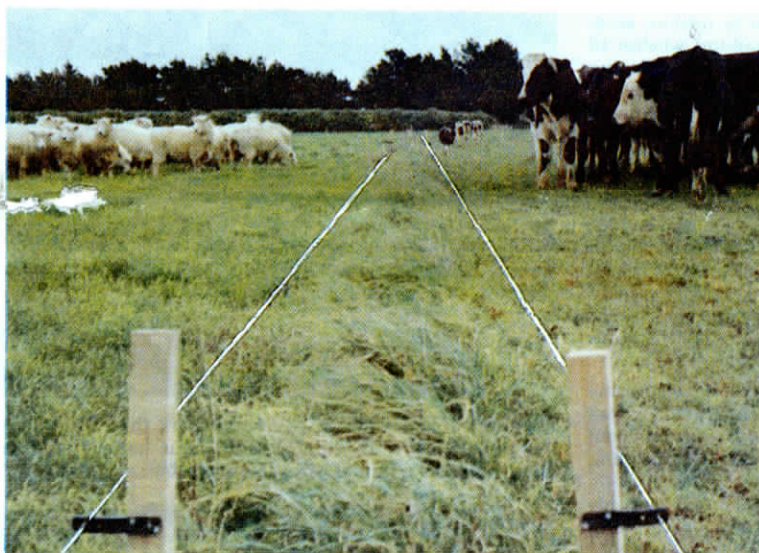

NEW "GRASSFENCE" CONCEPT

Cuts Fencing Costs in Half



Basic Grassfence consists of two electrified parallel wires spaced 24 in. apart and 12 in. off the ground, with grass growing in between.

You've never seen anything like Grassfence — an entirely new concept in fencing for cattle, sheep, horses and maybe even hogs that, according to the manufacturer, "cuts fencing costs in half and never needs maintenance."

The basic Grassfence consists of two parallel electrified wires spaced 24 in. apart and 12 in. off the ground, with grass growing in between.

Grass between the two electrified wires is left to grow into a miniature hedge that never needs mowing or trimming. Cattle and sheep won't graze over the wires, but they will graze inwards under them for about 4 in., explains Jack Henderson, president of Live Wire Products, Grass Valley, Calif., marketer of the new-style fence which was developed and first introduced three years ago in New Zealand. It's catching on fast on
